



# **Good day fine Gentles,** Its your friendly neighborhood Chatelaine! Here to talk to you about some newcomers information found in the Known World Handbook.

Since I have recently aquired myself my own copy, I figured I give you a bit of insight into this amazing book!

At first glance, you will see the cover. Full of examples of great scrible arts with a beautiful calligraphy style which gives the reader a glimpse into what is covered inside. It does looks like a beautiful scroll.

When you open the book, the first page is the introduction and acknowledgments, followed by the table of contents. Which brings you to the Glossary of Terms starting on page 7.



This glossary of terms is, as it states itself in the editor's note, is more like a lexicon than a true glossary of terms. The meaning of lexicon basically means the vocabulary of a person, language, or branch of knowledge as found on the Webster Dictionary online.

As I still consider myself new to the SCA. There is always something to learn. I did know much of the vocabulary, but not all, as some terms have not been used in my own presence as I recall. There are almost 4 pages of alphabetically listed helpful terms to learn!

One thing I really did like about the glossary itself was that every once in a while it would refer to a page number for more information. Now I really liked this for a couple of reasons. The fact that the glossary itself is in the front of the book makes a huge difference to understanding the literature that follows. As well as if you wanted to just jump ahead to a specific topic, you can do so with as much ease to navigate as the table of contents.

In my opinion this glossary was very well written and very inclusive to everyone. I can't wait to read the next chapter on the history!

### **Ingredients**

3+ cups flour (I usually use a mix of wheat and rye or whole wheat and unbleached. It works better if at least 1 cup of unbleached flour is used.)

½ tbls salt (I use coarse salt)

1 cup Sourdough starter

1 cup warm water (I use hot tap water, the same temperature you would use to activate baker yeast.)

½ cup + olive oil

### **Optional**

Toppings and additives such as raisins, walnuts, sundried tomatoes (chopped), olives, sesame seeds, poppy seeds, spices, etc... let your imagination go wild. I like to make bagels or bread with cinnamon, raisins and walnuts.

### Egg wash for bagels.

1 egg

1 tbls water. Whisked together.

Measure 3 cups of flour into bowl add salt and any spice that you decide to use.

Stir with a whisk to combine. In a 2 cup measuring cup at 1 cup of hot tap water.

Add sourdough starter until liquid comes up to the 2 cup point. Put this in a large bowl (I use a ceramic bread bowl as this holds the heat, which helps with the rising process.) Whisk until starter is dissolved, add flour and any addivites. Stir with a wooden spoon until the flour comes away from the sides of the bowl.

Turn out onto a floured surface and using as much flour as needed. (unbleached white flour is what I usually use.)

Knead dough until it forms and nice elastic/smooth ball. About 10 minutes.

Drizzle about 2 tables spoons of oil into bowl.

Place dough into bowl and cover with a damp cloth. Let rise until double in bulk. This takes about 5 hours, but can vary depending on the warmth of the kitchen. I've seen it be as little as 3 hours and as much as 12.

Shape loaf or bagels (this recipe makes 6-8 bagels), cover with damp cloth and let rise until double in bulk. This can be done for another 5 hours or so at room temperature or can be but in the fridge overnight. If you use the fridge method the take loaf/bagels from the fridge and let stand for at least an hour before going on to the next step.

Preheat oven to 400 or whichever temperature you like to bake bread at.

**For bread:** place in baking tray or pan and bake for 35 – 40 minutes or until bread sounds hollow when knocked on the bottom. This will vary depending on you chosen baking temperature. The times listed are for 400. If I bake any hotter it sets of my smoke alarm. My apartment does not have a range hood.

**For bagels:** fill an SS sauté pan fill ¾ full of water and bring to the boil. Add 1 tablespoon baking soda. Add bagels to boiling water and boil for 30 seconds, flip them over and boil other side for an additional 30 seconds. I find just counting to 30 slowly works. Do not crowd the pan. It usually takes 2 batches with my pan. Brush with egg wash and top as desired.

Bake for 20-25 minutes or until they sound hollow when knocked on the bottom.

# **Manuscript Visit** ~ Gelleia le Vinter

On March 4th, lady Gelleia le Vinter travelled to the Barony of Ramshaven to study the manuscripts at the University of Guelph on loan from Les Enluminures (France) until May 20, 2020. There are 9 available for viewing on the 2nd floor of McLaughlin Library in the special collections room during weekdays.

After 3 hours of studying, note taking and photographing, only four books were viewed! Most notably was the book of hours dating 1526. She also viewed a book of the dead dated 1487 (with added pages from 1727 which look like a ledger), a book of sermons from 1460-1475 and a confessional from 1468.

The confessional was written in Latin and Italian and featured one illuminated letter though the entire book and a fancy P on the following page. Gelleia thought ahead and brought rulers to show how small the artwork was, the capital C was a mere 15 mm square. The pages were approximately 110 mm x 150 mm with text columns on a justification of 100 mm x 70 mm.



"Although tiny and compact like many miscellanies used by the mendicant friars, this manuscript was an expensive production. It is copied in a formal script by well-trained scribes and includes an illuminated frontispiece at the beginning of the main text, the Confessionale of Bartholomaeus de Chaimis, an influential but rare text that still lacks a scholarly edition. Dated by the scribe, this is perhaps the oldest surviving copy and may have been produced under the direct supervision of the author."




### Text Manuscripts Les Luminures







Blue and red ink were used periodically to denote "and " as well as something else. There are many abbreviations used for common words or particularly long words (for example imperpetuum would be shortened to imppm (Collections).) and though she tried to find the meaning for both symbols, wasn't able to find the proper meaning of the perpendicular lines with a diagonal intersecting at the meeting point.



In the book of sermons, there was evidence of clergymen adding notes in Italian (either as a quick reference for themselves or ponderings on the interpretation from Latin?) in addition to the Latin text. In some instances, a paper was glued into the book instead of just adding notes to the margins.

Other than being impressed by the font size and neatness of the calligraphy, she was impressed by the steadfastness of the ink as a few pagers showed water damage however the words were still legible and not smeared. The water looked like it had mixed with the top layer of ink, pooled, and dried to leave a watermark over the page.

This was a very large volume and presumed to be only half of the sermons as this book started numbering on page 505 through to 1000. There were also headers used written in red ink to know one's place within the text. The leaves were a combination of parchment and paper, interestingly she could see and feel the difference between the two. One was much shinier and smoother in texture while the other held more dirt and had a porous appearance.


The book of the dead (hailing from Cologne, Germany) had an impressive front cover and was the largest of the books, each page with a justification of 170 mm x 100 mm. The book also had much larger calligraphy, approximately 5 mm high instead of the previously seen 2-3 mm in a gothic bookhand (Manuscripts of the Dead). Adding to the character, this book has some damage in the forms of a torn page repaired by thread stitches, and a child's crayon scribbles, a more modern addition surely. One of the back pages also seemed incomplete, as the margins were blocked out for calligraphy but never inked (image 9).


"...this carefully written and decorated liturgical manuscript from the important church of St. Kunibert in Cologne was used daily by the canons for the liturgy associated with death and burial. Dated and with a known donor, it is preserved in an elaborate sixteenth-century binding. It also includes an eighteenth-century necrology with names, dates, and burial location, making this an important document both as a record of people associated with the community and for the physical organization of the Church and its altars." (Manuscripts of the Dead)

While Gelleia was visiting the manuscripts, students were also studying the book of the dead and were discussing how to translate the bars of music into chants to be sung as part of a class presentation.

















While saving the most visually stunning book for last, the book of hours, did not disappoint. To touch and see this book was worth the travel alone!

This is actually a printed book from Paris, France (1526-1541) which has 17 large, 10 small and 16 medallions after the designs of Jean Pichore and likely hand painted in the Parisian workshop of Germain Hardouyn. (Printed Book of Hours (use of Rome)).

One of the librarians made note that the images in the book were metalcuts hand painted afterwards, and sometimes the artists would ignore the metalcuts and paint whatever they desired.

For example, in this copy there is a metalcut with the depiction of a skeleton and four figures in the border which has been painted yet in the copy from 1515, the metalcut is not painted and we can see the artistic license taking place. Each page has the same size text block with a 155 mm x 16 mm floral bar. The bars all have a painted gold background and a combination of blue and red flowers or acanthus leaves.



Below are some samples of the medallions (40mm x 40mm) and larger metalcuts (half page) found throughout the book. Of particular interest to Gelleia were the borders painted with gold paint instead of being gilded and the use of gold paint in a hatch stroke for shading on clothing.











This photo also shows the faint metalcut lines where the painter changed the background above the kneeling knight on the right. In the archway there is a country scene however when seen in person, there appears to be another knight standing and supporting his weight on a lance inked from the metalcut.
